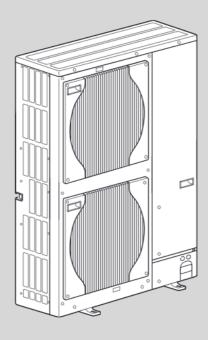

3-1. ALWAYS OBSERVE FOR SAFETY

Before obtaining access to terminal, all supply circuits must be disconnected.

Preparation before the repair service.

- · Prepare the proper tools.
- · Prepare the proper protectors.
- · Provide adequate ventilation.
- After stopping the operation of the air conditioner, turn off the power-supply breaker.
- · Discharge the condenser before the work involving the electric parts.

Precautions during the repair service.

- · Do not perform the work involving the electric parts with wet hands.
- · Do not pour water into the electric parts.
- · Do not touch the refrigerant.
- Do not touch the hot or cold areas in the refrigerating cycle.
- When the repair or the inspection of the circuit needs to be done without turning off the power, exercise great caution not to touch the live parts.

3-2. CAUTIONS RELATED TO NEW REFRIGERANT

Cautions for units utilizing refrigerant R410A

Use new refrigerant pipes.

In case of using the existing pipes for R22, be careful with the following:

- \cdot Be sure to perform replacement operation before test run.
- · Change flare nut to the one provided with this product. Use a newly flared pipe.
- · Avoid using thin pipes.

Make sure that the inside and outside of refrigerant piping is clean and it has no contaminants such as sulfur, oxides, dirt, shaving particles, etc, which are hazard to refrigerant cycle.

In addition, use pipes with specified thickness.

Contamination inside refrigerant piping can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil, etc.

Store the piping indoors, and both ends of the piping sealed until just before brazing. (Leave elbow joints, etc. in their packaging.)

If dirt, dust or moisture enters into refrigerant cycle, that can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil or malfunction of compressor.

The refrigerant oil applied to flare and flange connections must be ester oil, ether oil or alkylbenzene oil in a small amount.

If large amount of mineral oil enters, that can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil, etc.

Charge refrigerant from liquid phase of gas cylinder.

If the refrigerant is charged from gas phase, composition change may occur in refrigerant and the efficiency will be lowered.

Do not use refrigerant other than R410A.

If other refrigerant (R22, etc.) is used, chlorine in refrigerant can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil, etc.

Use a vacuum pump with a reverse flow check valve.

Vacuum pump oil may flow back into refrigerant cycle and that can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil, etc.

Use the following tools specifically designed for use with R410A refrigerant.

The following tools are necessary to use R410A refrigerant.

Handle tools with care.

If dirt, dust or moisture enters into refrigerant cycle, that can cause deterioration of refrigerant oil or malfunction of compressor.

Do not use a charging cylinder.

If a charging cylinder is used, the composition of refrigerant will change and the efficiency will be lowered.

Ventilate the room if refrigerant leaks during operation. If refrigerant comes into contact with a flame, poisonous gases will be released.

Use the specified refrigerant only.

Never use any refrigerant other than that specified.Doing so may cause a burst, an explosion, or fire when the unit is being used, serviced, or disposed of.

Correct refrigerant is specified in the manuals and on the spec labels provided with our products.

We will not be held responsible for mechanical failure, system malfunction, unit breakdown or accidents caused by failure to follow the instructions.

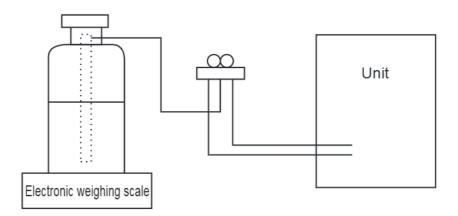
[1] Cautions for service

- (1) Perform service after recovering the refrigerant left in unit completely.
- (2) Do not release refrigerant in the air.
- (3) After completing service, charge the cycle with specified amount of refrigerant.
- (4) When performing service, install a filter drier simultaneously. Be sure to use a filter drier for new refrigerant.

[2] Additional refrigerant charge

When charging directly from cylinder

- · Check that cylinder for R410A on the market is a syphon type.
- Charging should be performed with the cylinder of syphon stood vertically. (Refrigerant is charged from liquid phase.)

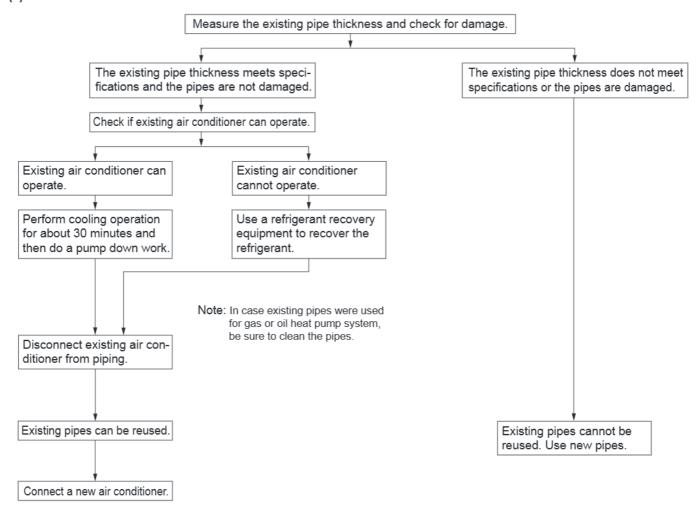

[4] Refrigerant leakage detection function

This air conditioner can detect refrigerant leakage which may happen during a long period of use. In order to enable the leakage detection, settings are required to let the unit memorize the initial conditions (initial learning). Refer to "13-4. INITIAL SETTINGS FOR REFRIGERANT LEAKAGE DETECTION FUNCTION".

3-3. PRECAUTIONS WHEN REUSING EXISTING R22 REFRIGERANT PIPES

(1) Flowchart



•The air conditioner automatically performs cooling operation through replace filter for about 2 hours.

(2) Cautions for refrigerant piping work

New refrigerant R410A is adopted for replacement inverter series. Although the refrigerant piping work for R410A is same as for R22, exclusive tools are necessary so as not to mix with different kind of refrigerant. Furthermore as the working pressure of R410A is 1.6 times higher than that of R22, their sizes of flared sections and flare nuts are different.

① Thickness of pipes

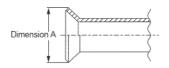
Because the working pressure of R410A is higher compared to R22, be sure to use refrigerant piping with thickness shown below. (Never use pipes of 0.7 mm or below.)

② Dimensions of flare cutting and flare nut

The component molecules in HFC refrigerant are smaller compared to conventional refrigerants. In addition to that, R410A is a refrigerant, which has higher risk of leakage because its working pressure is higher than that of other refrigerants. Therefore, to enhance airtightness and strength, flare cutting dimension of copper pipe for R410A has been specified separately from the dimensions for other refrigerants as shown below. The dimension B of flare nut for R410A also has partly been changed to increase strength as shown below. Set copper pipe correctly referring to copper pipe flaring dimensions for R410A below. For 1/2 and 5/8 inch pipes, the dimension B changes. Use torque wrench corresponding to each dimension.

9-1. REFRIGERANT COLLECTING (PUMP DOWN)

When relocating or disposing of the indoor/outdoor unit, pump down the system following the procedure below so that no refrigerant is released into the atmosphere.

- ① Turn off the power supply (circuit breaker).
- @ Connect the low pressure valve on the gauge manifold to the charge plug (low pressure side) on the outdoor unit.
- ③ Close the liquid stop valve completely.
- 4 Supply power (circuit breaker).
 - When power is supplied, make sure that "CENTRALLY CONTROLLED" is not displayed on the remote controller. If "CENTRALLY CONTROLLED" is displayed, the refrigerant collecting (pump down) cannot be completed normally.
 - Startup of the indoor-outdoor communication takes about 3 minutes after the power (circuit breaker) is turned on. Start the pump-down operation 3 to 4 minutes after the power (circuit breaker) is turned on.
- ⑤ Perform the refrigerant collecting operation (cooling test run).
 - Push the pump-down SWP switch (push-button type) on the control board of the outdoor unit. The compressor and ventilators (indoor and outdoor units) start operating (refrigerant collecting operation begins). (LED1 and LED2 on the control board of the outdoor unit are lit.)
 - Only push the pump-down SWP switch if the unit is stopped. However, even if the unit is stopped and the pump-down SWP switch is pushed less than 3 minutes after the compressor stops, the refrigerant collecting operation cannot be performed. Wait until the compressor has been stopped for 3 minutes and then push the pump-down SWP switch again.
- ⑥ Fully close the ball valve on the gas pipe side of the outdoor unit when the pressure gauge on the gauge manifold shows 0.05 to 0 MPa [Gauge] (approx. 0.5 to 0 kgf/cm²) and quickly stop the air conditioner.
 - Because the unit automatically stops in about 3 minutes when the refrigerant collecting operation is completed (LED1 off, LED2 lit), be sure to quickly close the gas ball valve. However, if LED1 is lit, LED2 is off, and the unit is stopped, open the liquid stop valve completely, close the valve completely after 3 minutes or more have passed, and then repeat step ⑤. (Open the gas ball valve completely.)
 - If the refrigerant collecting operation has been completed normally (LED1 off, LED2 lit), the unit will remain stopped until the power supply is turned off.
 - Note that when the extension piping is very long with a large refrigerant amount, it may not be possible to perform a pump-down operation. In this case, use refrigerant recovery equipment to collect all of the refrigerant in the system.
- Turn off the power supply (circuit breaker), remove the gauge manifold, and then disconnect the refrigerant pipes.

⚠ Warning:

When pumping down the refrigerant, stop the compressor before disconnecting the refrigerant pipes.

If the refrigerant pipes are disconnected while the compressor is operating and the stop valve (ball valve) is open, the
pressure in the refrigeration cycle could become extremely high if air is drawn in, causing the pipes to burst, personal
injury, etc.

9-2. UNIT REPLACEMENT OPERATION

When reusing the existing pipes that carried R22 refrigerant for the SW75/100/120 models, replacement operation must be performed before performing a test run.

- $\mathbin{\textcircled{\scriptsize 1}}$ If new pipes are used, these procedures are not necessary.
- ② If existing pipes that carried R22 refrigerant are used for the SW75/100/120 models, these procedures are not necessary. (The replacement operation cannot be performed.)
- ③ During replacement operation, "C5" is displayed on "A-Control Service Tool (PAC-SK52ST)". (This is applied to only SW75/100/120 models.)

9-3. START AND FINISH OF TEST RUN

- Operation from the indoor unit
 - Execute the test run using the installation manual for the indoor unit.
- · Operation from the outdoor unit
- By using the DIP switch SW4 on the control board of outdoor unit, test run can be started and finished, and its operation mode (cooling/heating) can be set up.
- ① Set the operation mode (cooling/heating) using SW4-2.
- 2 Turn on SW4-1 to start test run with the operation mode set by SW4-2.
- 3 Turn off SW4-1 to finish the test run.
- There may be a faint knocking sound around the machine room after power is supplied, but this is no problem with product because the linear expansion pipe is just moving to adjust opening pulse.
- There may be a knocking sound around the machine room for several seconds after compressor starts operating. However, this is not a problem with product because it is generated by the check valve itself due to a small pressure difference in the refrigerant circuit.

Note:

The operation mode cannot be changed by SW4-2 during test run. (To change test run mode, stop the unit by SW4-1, change the operation mode and restart the test run by SW4-1.)

TROUBLESHOOTING

10-1. TROUBLESHOOTING

<Check code displayed by self-diagnosis and actions to be taken for service (summary)>

Present and past check codes are logged, and they can be displayed on the control board of outdoor unit. Actions to be taken for service, which depends on whether or not the trouble is reoccurring in the field, are summarized in the table below. Check the contents below before investigating details.

10-2. CHECK POINT UNDER TEST RUN

10-2-1. Before test run

(1) Before test run

- After installation of indoor and outdoor units, piping work and electric wiring work, re-check that there is no refrigerant leakage, loosened connections and incorrect polarity.
- Measure impedance between the ground and the power supply terminal block (L, N) on the outdoor unit by 500 V Megger and check that it is 1.0 M Ω or over.
- Do not use 500V Megger to indoor/outdoor connecting wire terminal block (S1, S2, S3) and remote controller terminal block (1, 2). This may cause malfunction.
- Make sure that test run switch (SW4) is set to OFF before turning on power supply.
- Turn on power supply for 12 hours before test run in order to protect compressor.
- For specific models which requires higher ceiling settings or power failure automatic recovery, make proper changes of settings referring to the description of "Selection of Functions through Remote Controller".
 Make sure to read operation manual before test run. (Especially items to secure safety.)

*After turning on the power supply, the system will go into startup mode, "PLEASE WAIT" will blink on the display section of the room temperature, and lamp (green) of the remote controller will flash.

As to INDOOR BOARD LED, LED1 will be lit up, LED2 will either be lit up in case the address is 0 or turned off in case the address is not 0. LED3 will blink.

As to OUTDOOR BOARD LED, LED1 (green) and LED2 (red) will be lit up. (After the startup mode of the system finishes, LED2 (red) will be turned off.)

In case OUTDOOR BOARD LED is digital display, — and — will be displayed alternately every second.

• If one of the above operations does not function correctly, the causes written below should be considered. Find causes from the symptoms.

(1) Operation summary of the linear expansion valve

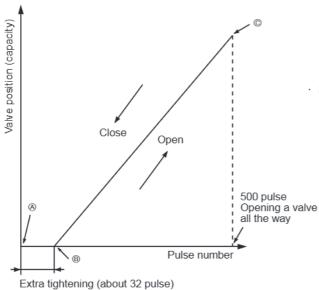
- · Linear expansion valve opens/closes through stepping motor after receiving the pulse signal from the outdoor controller board.

When the valve moves smoothly, there is no sound or vibration occurring from the linear expansion valve: however, when the pulse number moves from ® to @ or when the valve is locked, sound can be heard.

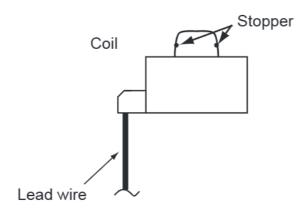
No sound is heard when the pulse number moves from ® to ® in case coil is burnt out or motor is locked by open-phase.

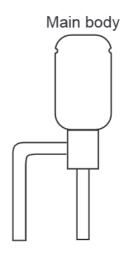
 Sound can be detected by placing the ear against the screw driver handle while putting the screw driver to the linear expansion valve.

(3) How to attach and detach the coil of linear expansion valve

<Composition>

Linear expansion valve is separable into the main body and the coil as shown in the diagram below.

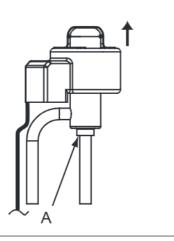




<How to detach the coil>

Hold the lower part of the main body (shown as A) firmly so that the main body does not move and detach the coil by pulling it upward.

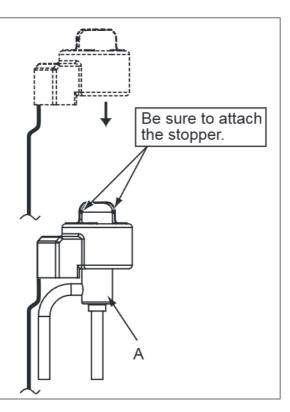
Be sure to detach the coil holding main body firmly. Otherwise pipes can bend due to stress.



<How to attach the coil>

Hold the lower part of the main body (shown as A) firmly so that the main body does not move and attach the coil by inserting it downward into the main body. Then securely attach the coil stopper to main body. (At this time, be careful that stress is not added to lead wire and main body is not wound by lead wire.) If the stopper is not firmly attached to main body, coil may be detached from the main body and that can cause defective operation of linear expansion valve.

To prevent piping stress, be sure to attach the coil holding the main body of linear expansion valve firmly. Otherwise pipe may break.



10-8. EMERGENCY OPERATION (FOR AIR-CONDITIONERS)

(1) When any check codes shown below is displayed on outdoor unit, or microcomputer for wired remote controller or indoor unit has a failure while no other problems are found, emergency operation will be available by setting the emergency operation switch (SWE) ON and short-circuiting the connector (CN31) on outdoor controller board.

When following abnormalities occur, emergency operation will be available.

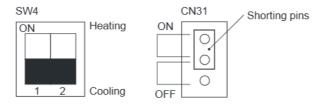

(2) Check the following items and cautions for emergency operation

- ① Make sure that there is no abnormality in outdoor unit other than the above abnormalities. (Emergency operation will not be available when check code other than the above are indicated.)
- ② For emergency operation, it is necessary to set the emergency operation switch (SWE) on indoor controller board. Refer to the electrical wiring diagram of indoor unit for how to set the indoor unit.
- ③ During emergency operation, the air-conditioner will continuously be operated by supplying power and stopping it: It cannot be turned on or off by remote control, and temperature control is not possible.
- ④ Do not perform emergency heating operation for an extended period of time: If the outdoor unit starts defrosting during this period, cold air will blow out from the indoor unit.
- ⑤ Do not perform emergency cooling operation for more than 10 hours: Neglecting this could result in freezing the heat exchanger in indoor unit.

(3) Emergency operation procedure

- ① Turn the main power supply off.
- ② Turn on the emergency operation switch (SWE) on indoor controller board.
- ③ Set the shorting pins of emergency operation connector (CN31) on outdoor controller board to ON.
- ① Use SW4-2 on outdoor controller board to set the operation mode (cooling or heating). (SW4-1 is not used.)

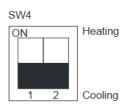


⑤ Turning the main power supply on will start the emergency operation.

(4) Releasing emergency operation

- ① Turn the main power supply off.
- ② Set the emergency operation switch (SWE) on indoor controller board to OFF.
- ③ Set the shorting pins of emergency operation connector (CN31) on outdoor controller board to OFF.
- 4 Set SW4-2 on outdoor controller board as shown in the right.

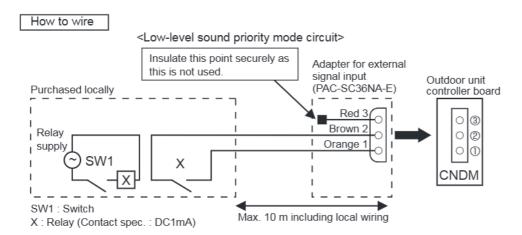
(a) Low-level sound priority mode (Local wiring)

Unit enters into Low-level sound priority mode by external signal input setting.

Inputting external signals to the outdoor unit decreases the outdoor unit operation sound 3 to 4 dB lower than that of usual. Adding a commercial timer or on-off switch contactor setting to the CNDM connector which is optional contactor for demand input located on the outdoor controller board enables to control compressor operation frequency.

The performance depends on the load of conditioned outdoor temperature.

NOTE: When the DIP SW 9-1 on the control board of the outdoor unit is ON, set DIP SW9-1 to OFF.



- 1) Make the circuit as shown above with adapter for external signal input (PAC-SC36NA-E).
- Turn SW1 to on for Low-level sound priority mode.
 Turn SW1 to off to release Low-level sound priority mode and normal operation.
- (b) On demand control (Local wiring) only for air-conditioners

Demand control is available by external input. In this mode, power consumption is decreased within the range of usual 0-100%.

How to wire

Basically, the wiring is same with (a).

Connect an SW 1 which is procured locally between Orange and Red (1 and 3) of the adapter for external signal input (PAC-SC36NA-E), and insulate the tip of the brown lead wire.

It is possible to set it to the following power consumption (compared with ratings) by setting the SW7-1, 2.

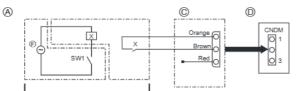

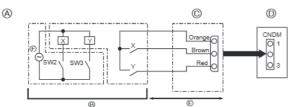

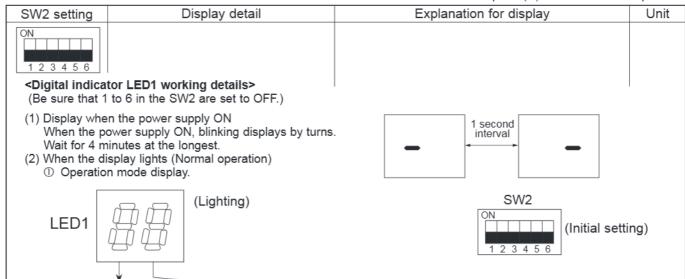

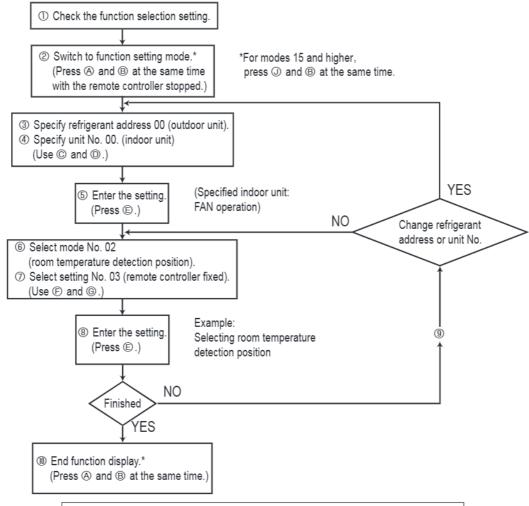

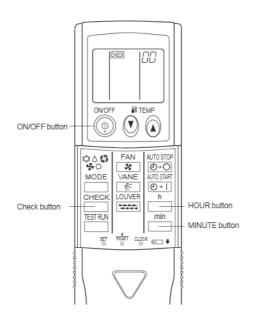

11-1-3. Selecting functions using the wireless remote controller (Type C)

Functions can be selected with the wireless remote controller. Function selection using wireless remote controller is available only for refrigerant system with wireless function. Refrigerant address cannot be specified by the wireless remote controller.

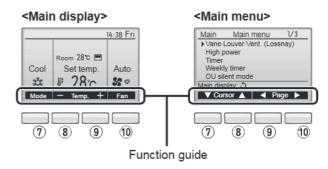

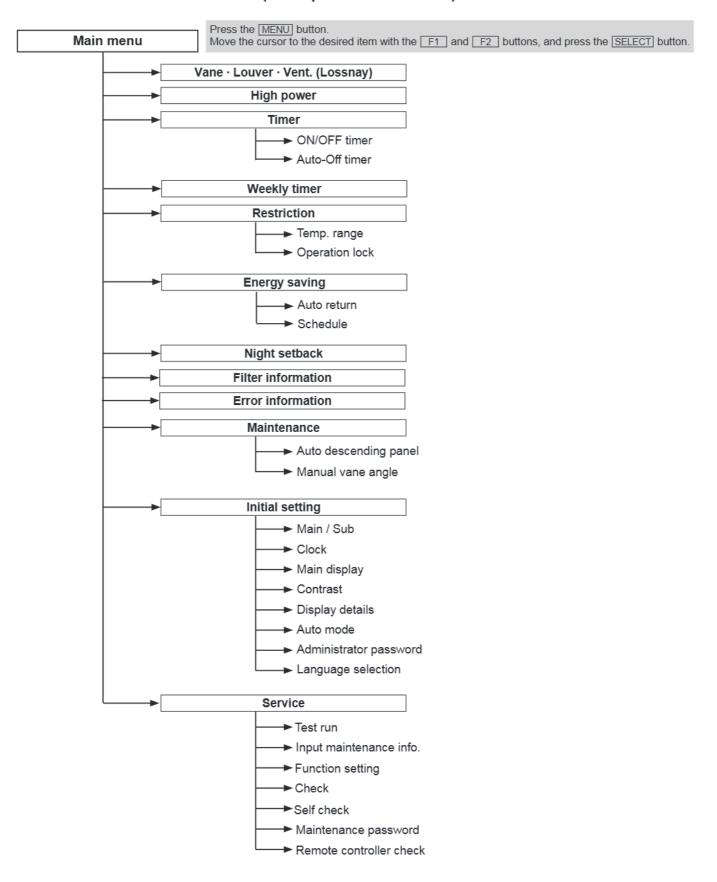

13-4. INITIAL SETTINGS FOR REFRIGERANT LEAKAGE DETECTION FUNCTION

13-4-1. PAR-3xMAA ("x" represents 0 or later)

Refrigerant leakage is detected after a long time.

OPERATING PROCEDURE 1. Removing the service panel and top panel

(1) Remove 3 service panel fixing screws (5 × 12) and slide the hook on the right downward to remove the service

(2) Remove screws (2 for front, 3 for rear/5 × 12) of the top panel and remove it.



2. Removing the fan motor (MF1, MF2)

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Remove 5 fan grille fixing screws (5 × 12) to detach the fan grille. (Top and bottom) (See Photo 1)
- (4) Remove a nut (for right handed screw of M6) to detach the propeller. (Top and bottom) (See Photo 2-1)
- (5) Disconnect the connectors, CNF1, CNF2 on controller circuit board in electrical parts box.
- (6) Remove 4 fan motor fixing screws (5 × 20) to detach the fan motor. (Top and bottom) (See Photo 2-2)
- 7) Loosen the clamp for lead wires on the motor support.

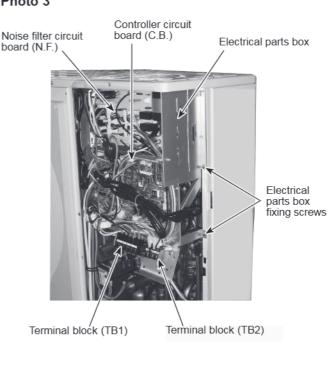
Note: Due to a parts-sharing, the fan motor for service has longer lead wires. Upon replacement, tie up any excessive lead wires in a bundle, then fix it with a clamp in the electrical parts box.

3. Removing the electrical parts box

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Disconnect the indoor/outdoor connecting wire and the power supply wire from terminal block.
- (4) Disconnect the connector CNF1, CNF2, LEV-A, LEV-B and LEV-C on the controller circuit board.

- (5) Disconnect the pipe-side connections of the following parts.
 - Thermistor <Liquid>(TH3)

 - Thermistor <2-phase pipe>(TH6)
 - Thermistor <Ambient>(TH7)
 - Thermistor < Suction > (TH32)
 - Thermistor <Ref. check> (TH33)
 - Thermistor < Comp. surface> (TH34)
 - High pressure switch (63H)
 - Low pressure switch (63L)
 - · High pressure sensor (63HS)
 - · 4-way valve coil (21S4)
 - Reactors (ACL1, ACL2, ACL3)
- (6) Remove the terminal cover and disconnect the compressor lead wire.
- (7) Loosen the clamp for lead wires on the separator.
- (8) Remove 2 electrical parts box fixing screws (4 × 10) and detach the electrical parts box by pulling it upward. The electrical parts box is fixed with 2 hooks on the left and 1 hook on the right.

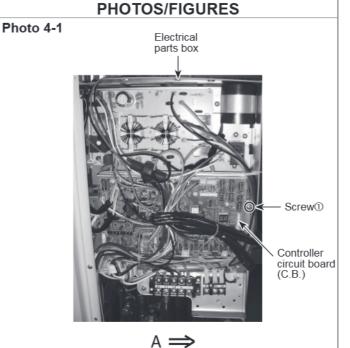


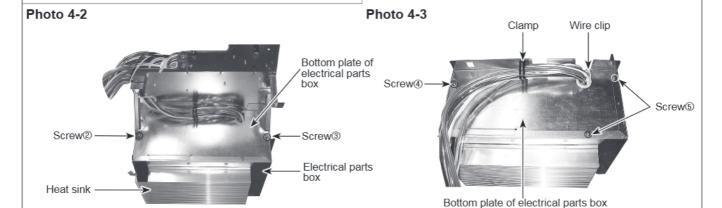


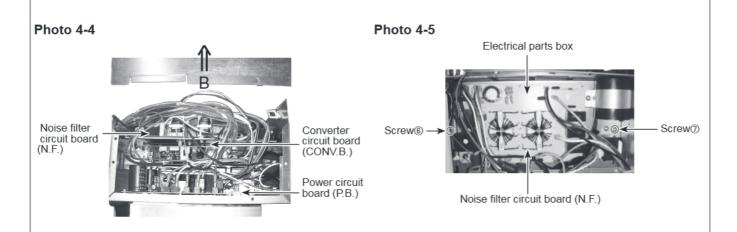
4. Disassembling the electrical parts box

- Disconnect all the connectors on the controller circuit board.
- (2) Remove the 3 screws, screw ①, ② and ③, that fix the plate equipped with the outdoor controller circuit board, and the electrical parts box, screw ① from the front and the screw ② and ③ from the bottom of the electrical parts box. (See Photo 4-1 and 4-2)
- (3) Slide the plate in the direction of the arrow A and remove it. (See Photo 4-1)
- (4) Remove the lead wires from the clamp and the wire clip on the bottom of the electrical parts box. (See Photo 4-3)
- (5) Remove the 3 screws, screw (a) and (b), that fix the bottom side of the electrical parts box and remove the bottom side plate by sliding in the direction of the arrow B. (See Photo 4-3 and 4-4)
- (6) Remove the noise filter circuit board from the electrical parts box. Then remove the 2 screws, screw ⑥ and ⑦, that fix the plate equipped with the noise filter circuit board and converter circuit board. (See Photo 4-5)

Note: When reassembling the electrical parts box, make sure the wirings are correct.

 Pull out the thermistor <2-phase pipe> (TH6) and thermistor <Ambient> (TH7) from the sensor holder.

Note: When replacing thermistor <2-phase pipe> (TH6) or thermistor <Ambient> (TH7), replace it together.

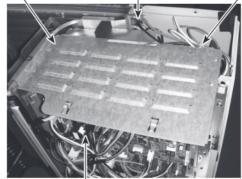

Electrical parts box

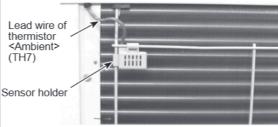

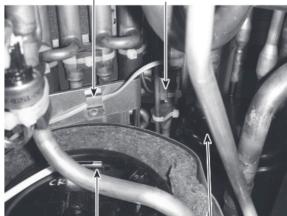

8. Removing the 4-way valve coil (21S4), and linear expansion Photo 8-1 valve coil (LEV-A, LEV-B, LEV-C)

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)

[Removing the 4-way valve coil]

- (3) Remove 4-way valve coil fixing screw (M5 × 6).
- Remove the 4-way valve coil by sliding the coil toward you. Loosen the clamp for lead wires on the separator. Loosen 2 fasteners and the cable strap for lead wires in the electrical parts box.
- (5) Disconnect the connector 21S4 (green) on the controller circuit board in the electrical parts box.

[Removing the linear expansion valve coil]

- (3) Remove the linear expansion valve coil by sliding the coil 4-way valve coil upward.
 - Loosen the clamp for lead wires on the separator.
- (4) Disconnect the connectors, LEV-A (white), LEV-B (red) and LEV-C(blue) on the controller circuit board in the electrical parts box

9. Removing the 4-way valve

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Remove 3 valve bed fixing screws (4 × 10) and 4 ball valve and stop valve fixing screws (5 × 16) then remove the valve bed.
- (4) Remove 5 side panel (R) fixing screws (5 × 12) in the rear of the unit then remove the side panel (R).
- Remove the 4-way valve coil.
- (6) Recover refrigerant.
- (7) Remove the welded part of 4-way valve.

Note: When installing the 4-way valve, cover it with a wet cloth to prevent it from heating (120°C or more), then braze the pipes so that the inside of pipes are not oxidized.

10. Removing linear expansion valve

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- Remove the valve bed. (Refer to procedure 9)
- (4) Remove the side panel (R). (Refer to procedure 9)
- (5) Remove the linear expansion valve coil.
- (6) Recover refrigerant.
- (7) Remove the welded part of linear expansion valve.

Note: When installing the linear expansion valve, cover it with a wet cloth to prevent it from heating (120°C or more), then braze the pipes so that the inside of pipes are not oxidized.

11. Removing the high pressure switch (63H), the low pressure switch (63L) and the pressure sensor (63HS)

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Remove the valve bed. (Refer to procedure 9)
- (4) Remove the side panel (R). (Refer to procedure 9)
- (5) Pull out the lead wire of high pressure switch and low pressure switch.
- Recover refrigerant.
- (7) Remove the welded part of high pressure switch, low pressure switch, and the pressure sensor (63HS).

Note: When installing the high pressure switch, cover it with a wet cloth to prevent it from heating (100°C or more), then braze the pipes so that the inside of pipes are not oxidized.

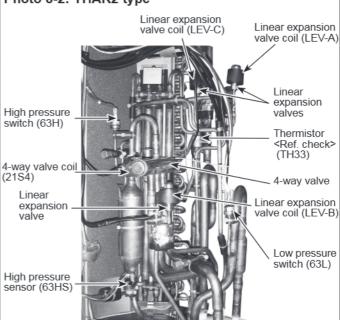

12. Removing the reactors (ACL1, ACL2, ACL3)

- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Remove the 6 screws, that fix the front panel and remove the front panel.
- (4) Remove the 2 screws, screw ® and ® (both 4 × 10), that fix the separator, screw ® from the valve bed and screw ® from the bottom of the separator, and tilt the separator to the side of the fan motor slightly. (See Photo 12-1)
- (5) Disconnect the lead wires from the reactor and remove the 4 screws, screw (iii), that fix the reactor to remove the reactor. (See photo 12-3.)

Note 1: The reactor is very heavy (4kg)! Be careful when handling it.

Note 2: The reactor box is also removable.

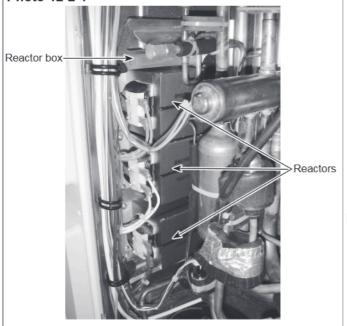
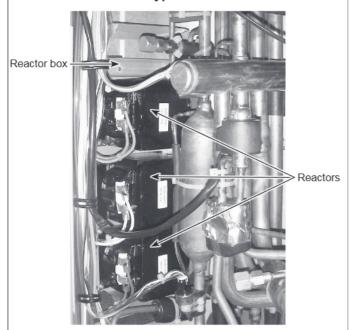
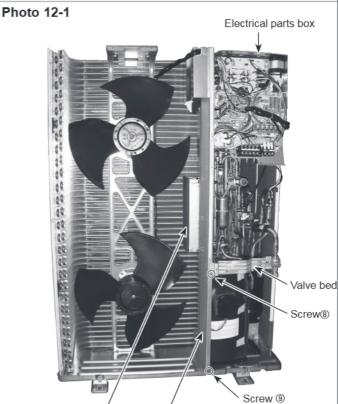


Photo 12-2-2: YHAR2 type



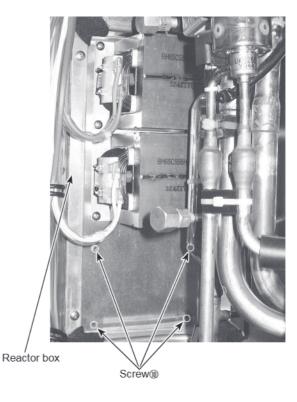

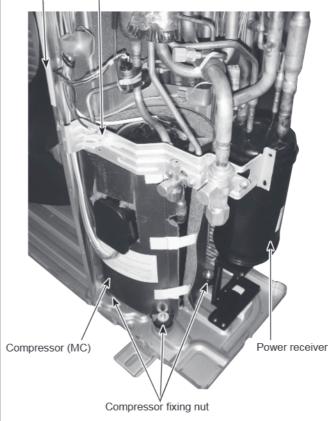
- (1) Remove the service panel. (See Photo 1)
- (2) Remove the top panel. (See Photo 1)
- (3) Remove 2 cover panel (front) fixing screws (5 × 12) and remove the cover panel (front). (See Photo 1)
- (4) Remove 2 cover panel (rear) fixing screws (5 × 12) and remove the cover panel (rear).
- (5) Remove the electrical parts box. (See Photo 3)
- (6) Remove the valve bed. (Refer to procedure 9)
- (7) Remove the side panel (R). (Refer to procedure 9)
- (8) Remove 3 separator fixing screws (4 × 10) and remove the separator.
- (9) Remove the soundproof cover for compressor.
- (10) Recover refrigerant.
- (11) Remove the welded pipe of compressor inlet and outlet then remove the compressor.
- (12) Remove the 3 points of the compressor fixing nut using a spanner or a adjustable wrench.

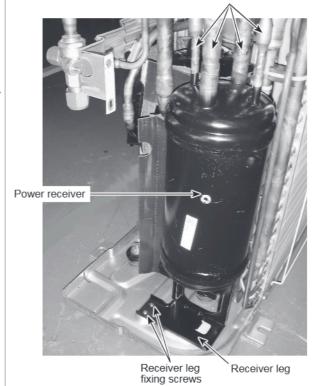
